1.1 Purpose of the Challenge.

To evaluate each contestant's ability to organize and execute a given work load accurately and safely.

1.3 Skills and Knowledge to be tested.

2. SKILLS FOR SUCCESS

24" Level Wood chisel or chisel set Twist Drill Set up to 3/8" Hammer Framing Square (optional) 10-12 Point Finishing Saw (optional) Block Plane (optional)

(NOTE: Contestants are free to bring any other hand tools they wish, but no extra marks will be awarded for additional tools.) All tools should be properly maintained and stored in a tool box or tool bag
